Family physician Dr. Dilip Deshpande said unattended filth can lead to epidemics like malaria, dengue, typhoid, cholera and hepatitis.

## For no fault of theirs, villagers suffer at Urali, Phursungi

The villagers are up in arms against the PMC for dumping the city's garbage at the outskirts of the hamlet.

It is the only landfill for the city's garbage. The villagers are demanding that the civic body has alternate dumping sites so that the entire bulk of the city's filth does not come to the village. Meanwhile, as the city wallowed in filth and

villagers' dumping was leading to the stink in the area. More over, there are no adequate facilities for collection of household and the townships, leading ground and surface water contamination. Landfills are there but they are not used.

It has the potential to cause substantial damage to the groundwater in the vicinity of the dumped garbage. Landfills must never be allowed to get into water bodies being created.

The samples of leachate collected are found to be exceeding the permitted standards. The local villagers are demanding the PMC for the location.

"They are not to be misled by the news about thePMC will take action if needed. The MPCB will not remain a cheap operator in this case. We have recently issued a directive to the PMC instructing it to carry out various measures to a time bound manner. These measures include the following: The first requirement of leachate is to monitor it. If the corporation fails to do so, then the MPCB will take up necessary actions under the law. It may be, we can also force the PMC to stop the site."

**ASSURANCE**

Additional Municipal Commissioner Maheshwarankar said the disposal of garbage at the site near Urali Devachi has started since Tuesday morning.

"By Wednesday evening, we shall be able to clear the site's garbage that had piled up for the last few days," he said.

He said that the MPCB will take action if needed.

The PMC regional office at Maharashtra Pollution Control Board (MPCB) had also issued the PMC around three days ago to stop the garbage from being dumped at the site.

"Since I did not agree, they locked out," he added. The villagers complained that the fringe and reputation of the two villages have suffered a lot due to the garbage problem. Sargunshi at Phursungi village has been hit hard. He said that most of the parents put a condition before the marriage that the bridegroom must relocate to another place along with his wife.

"The youth are believed as not have their parents and property in the village. It is not possible for them to leave the village and go away when marriages," Laxmi said. In addition, this has forced many youth to remain bachelors.

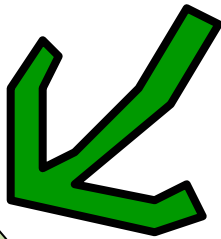

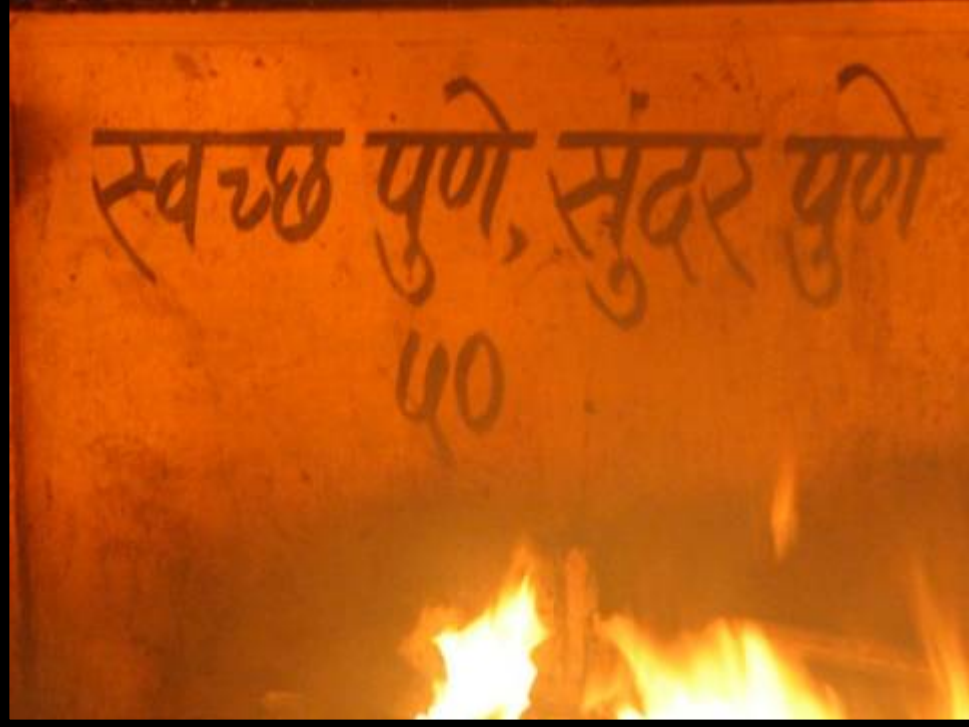

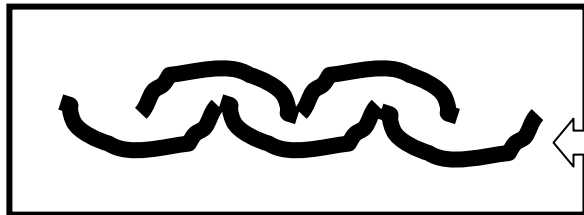

Half cut bottles can be used as roofing tiles too!

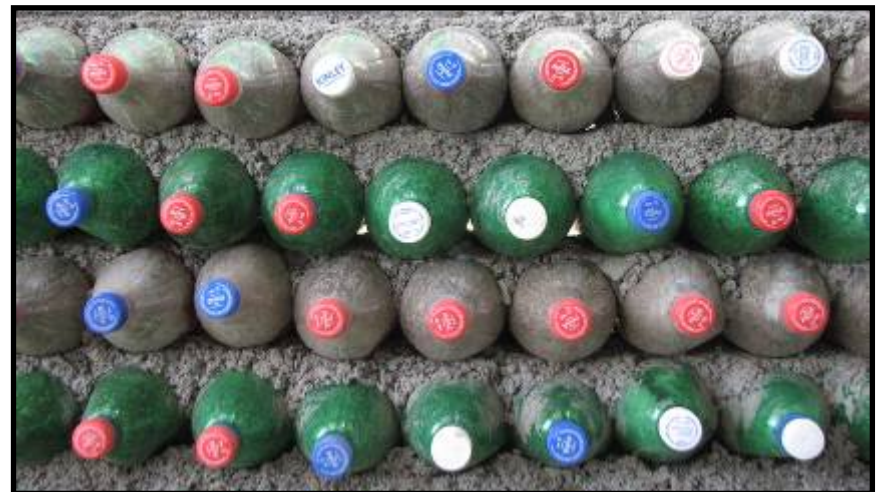

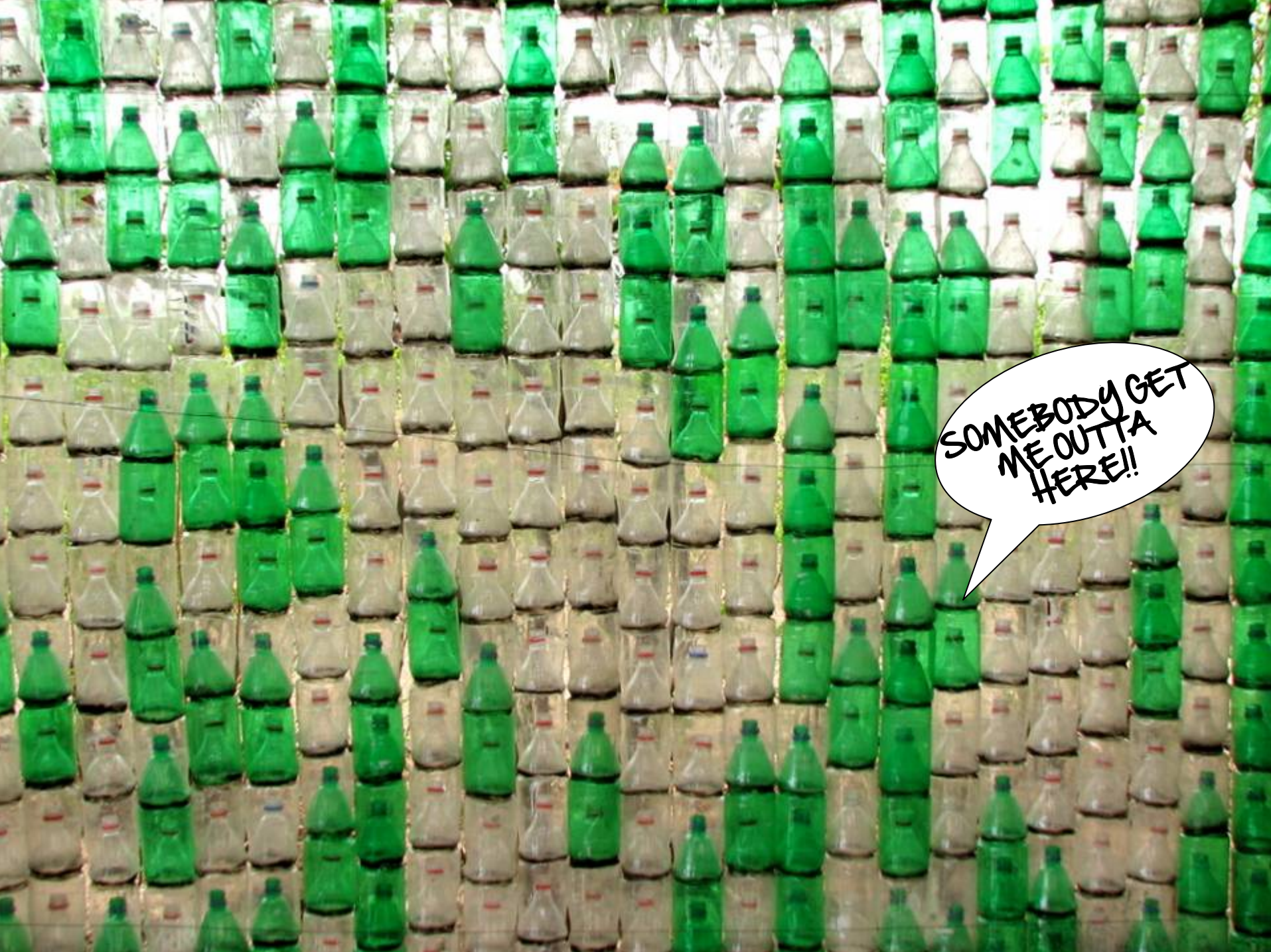
