The Consortium for DEWATS Dissemination (CDD) Society aims to promote and improve the social, economic and environmental conditions of the disadvantaged and marginalised people in South Asia through the provision of Decentralised Basic Needs Services (DBNS).

CDD Society comprehends that rapid urbanisation in Indian cities has created a shortfall in the supply of infrastructure and services leading to a deteriorating environment. The centralised systems are becoming unmanageable for the local authorities. Therefore, decentralised basic needs services can complement the conventional centralised systems for better delivery of services to people. CDD Society believes that building capacities to provide these services would bridge the gap between demand and supply of basic needs services. CDD Society offers various specialised trainings under its DBNS programme. It has a core team of trainers who are expert professionals in the areas of engineering, architecture, environment, infrastructure, social development and management.
